Our Film class students wrapped up their production of their film interpretation of "Subtext". Students split up into several groups, and executed an impressive degree of team work.

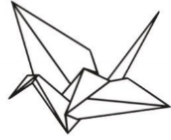


## Food Fair & Christmas Party

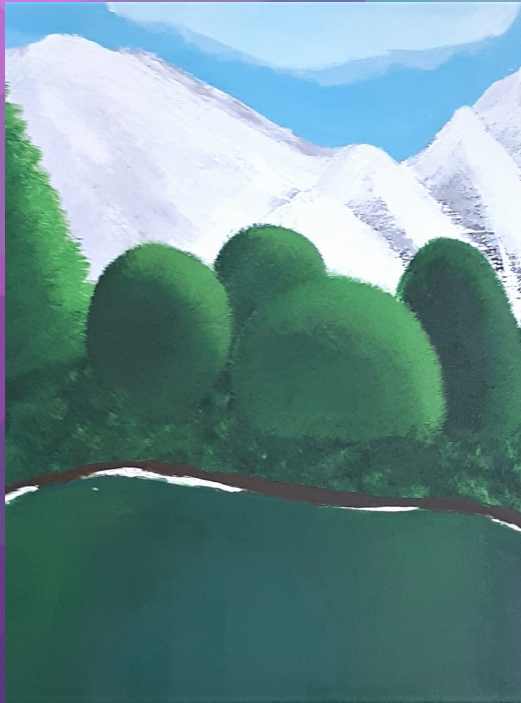
# PINK SHIRT DAY!

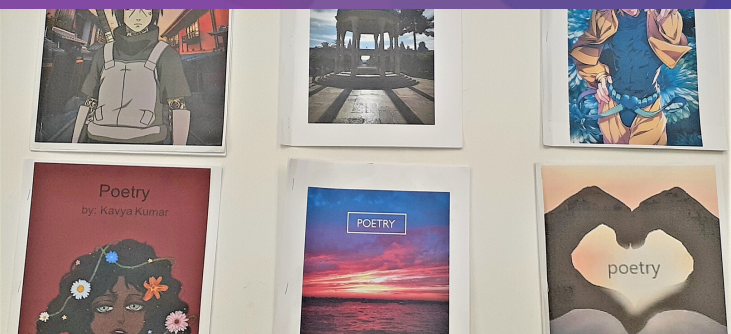
## **VISUAL ARTS**

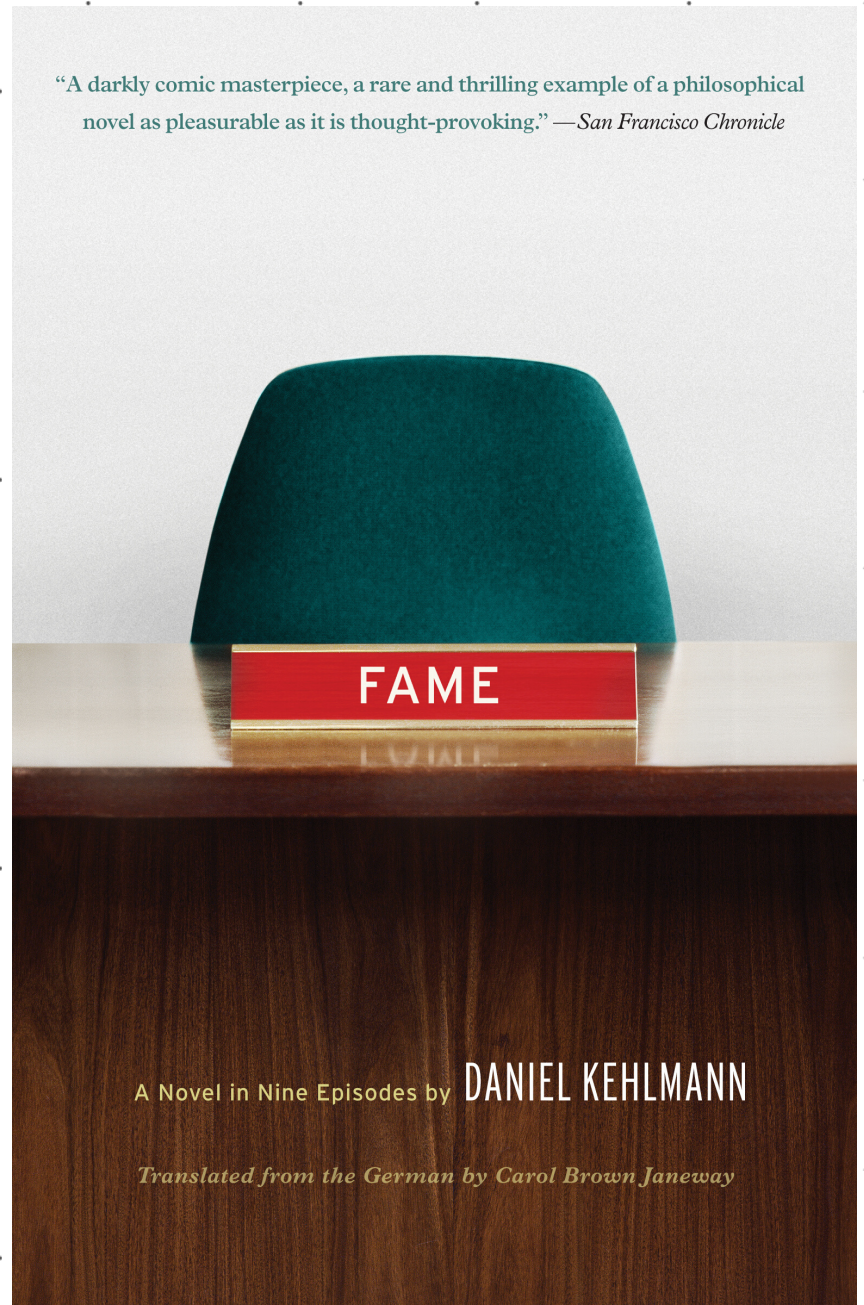
# English Department: Book Review

**The Higher Level IB Language and Literature class has finished exploring their first novel, *Fame*, by German author Daniel Kehlmann. See what one student thought about it!**

*Fame* by Daniel Kehlmann is an intricate book with many twists and turns to portray the question of how fame affects one's identity. Daniel Kehlmann is a German writer from Munich, and his most popular book was "Measuring the World", written in 2005. Shortly after that, he wrote *Fame*, a book that is vastly different in terms of narrative technique and plot continuity. This collection of episodes takes you through a whirlwind of stories and climaxes; each story is related to one another in different ways and as the novel goes on, we see references to previous characters. The way this book was written goes against the basic rules and structure of short stories - we get to know each character through a different narrator and we even have a sense of Daniel Kehlmann himself incorporated in the story, possibly disguised as one of the characters we meet. This book is odd and somewhat confusing, but in the end it is a really good read, and I would recommend it if you like subtle, yet funny humour with a darker twist on life. Overall, this was an excellent novel, that I would definitely read again.

## REPORT CARDS

# STUDENT INSURANCE POLICY CHANGE

Alexander Academy made changes to its policy regarding student insurance at the end of 2019, and would like to remind all agents, parents and students of the change. Please view the new insurance policy surrounding international students below:

*September/Fall semester: New BC residents arriving from foreign or US locations and returning BC residents arriving from outside Canada must provide proof of Private Medical Insurance that is valid for the duration of the academic school year (September to June 30th) in addition to being enrolled in the BC Medical Services Plan (MSP)*

*January/Winter semester: New BC residents arriving from foreign or US locations and returning BC residents arriving from outside Canada must provide proof of Private Medical Insurance that is valid from January to June 30th. In the following September to June 30th school year, they must provide proof of Private Medical Insurance for the duration of the academic school year (September to June 30th) in addition to being enrolled in the BC Medical Services Plan.*
